

FUND RAISING PROGRESS - WE ARE OVER £80K!

Progress with Fundraising

Since the last Newsletter, our fundraising total has gone up from £33k to over £80k, a truly fantastic result so far. Recent donations include:

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Plus many more smaller donations from organisations and individuals, and income from many fundraising activities by our own Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Committee and supporters (see picture of car boot sale of Jumble leftovers)

We still await responses to our applications for funds from the National Lottery, Santander, Foyle Foundation, Veolia, Nisa, and the Heathrow Community Fund. We are also in discussion with the Council about the possibility of a significant grant from them.

Our most recent large donation was £5,000 from the Metropolitan Masonic Charity, following an earlier donation of the same amount from Middlesex Masons. Leo Mindel, Paul Medlycott and Stephen Plume represented us at Freemasons' Hall on 29th November, where they were shown around the very impressive art-deco building which you would recognise from many films, and met representatives from other charities who have benefited from donations this year. The Metropolitan Grand Lodge make charitable donations of around £2.5 million per year. Past recipients have included the London Air Ambulance and next year they are aiming to raise £2.5 million for the London Fire Brigade to purchase two appliances capable of reaching heights of between 24-26 storeys. We are very grateful to their members for our donation.

If you have any ideas for approaching organisations for funds, please talk to one of our fundraising committee or one of our leaders. We will be only too pleased to follow up any leads.

We are absolutely delighted and feel confident that we will reach our target of £100k on time.

Our forecast is that the existing hut will be demolished completely in June, virtually immediately after a well known Spring event has been put to bed. The new foundations will follow immediately the site is clear with construction of the new building taking place in July. We hope that by Christmas 2018 the project will be completed.

In our last newsletter we asked for volunteers to contact us if they could lend any assistance with electrical work, plumbing or decorating. We do not feel that the tasks required are particularly onerous and therefore repeat our plea to the hundred or so parents out there to let us know whether they can assist in any way.

We hoped to announce in this newsletter the date of the Jumble sale, probably sometime next May but suddenly we hear that there is going to be a royal wedding, and without a day off work apparently. It is all out of our control so please wait patiently for announcements.

We end on a sad note by extending our condolences to David and Gwen Ransom following the recent loss of their son Graham following decades of devotion by them. David was a member of our Executive Committee for a number of years and the family were always loyal supporters, attending the social functions we organised.

I will end my piece by hoping you have a very enjoyable Christmas and New Year and that you spare a thought for others less fortunate than ourselves.

We are investigating all options for storage at the moment, but they all work out quite expensive, so please help us if you can.

Poindextor Explorers

The term started with three teams taking part in the annual Sky Camp at Paccar campsite. The aim is to build a platform amongst the trees to sleep in and cook on. There is a set height from the ground and a max height you can build to (for safety reasons). You win points for your building and lose points for not following the build rules. Throughout the weekend there are challenges to gain more points.

I have been before, this year seemed there were more teams. I like Sky camp as it challenges my pioneering skills, opens up your mind to what you can build, improves your problem solving and team skills and I get to sleep in a tree with my friends. Then whenever you make an online purchase at any of the stores listed on their site, such as Boots, Amazon, John Lewis, Expedia, Argos, Ebay and hundreds more, you place your order via easyfundraising instead of going direct, and we get a donation. It costs you nothing, and gains YOUR SCOUT GROUP a lot of money.

Having registered yourself, please pass the idea on to everyone you can think of who might use online shopping. That way we should build up a good list of supporters. When I wrote in the last *First News* we had thirteen registered supporters and set a target of a hundred supporters by the end of the year. Since then that number has crept up to nineteen! Come on, we can do better than that!
