None of this is paid by the section termly subs.

The funds raised over the years, led by the Group Executive, paid for our new Scouting Centre, minibus and other equipment that is used by the sections, which is why it is important that when fund raising activities are put on that we get as much support as possible from the families of our young members otherwise we will have to look at increasing the subs we charge each term.

Undoubtedly one of the most significant achievements accomplished over recent times is the commitment of all our Leaders to keeping their sections functioning during lockdown. Not an easy task but they have dedicated their efforts which has resulted in Scouting at 1<sup>st</sup> Northwood excelling in so many respects.

The long-awaited news that sections could return was more than welcome. It is gratifying that the numbers of children returning is at least equivalent to those who attended before lockdown. They are not only returning to meetings but should also be content with the state of the grounds around the Scout Centre which are looking very respectable. The 'shop window', namely the grass area, is completely clothed. The planters provide a touch of colour and the new hedge running the length of perimeter fence is putting on some encouraging growth. We have a new front path and drainage system by the entrance gate, a secure store for our Calor Gas cylinders and a remote controlled, ceiling-mounted projector inside the building. An effective outside lighting scheme has been installed in readiness for the dark nights which are not so very far away.

Although we have mentioned it many times before, scrap metal continues to accumulate and we are grateful to all those who either save it for us or bring items to us for disposal. While the amount of income we receive from this material fluctuates due to factors beyond our control, it is certainly a worthwhile exercise.

Managing all the changes and restrictions over the last year would not have been possible without the support of all the parents who stepped up to fill the parent rota. #### **Explorer Round-up**

Despite the disruption caused by last minute isolation notifications and the normal absences for exams we managed to continue to offer weekly meetings to the Explorer Unit throughout the last term. Attendance was regularly above thirty-five so split meetings took place most weeks,

The unit has challenged themselves with fire lighting, pioneering and construction at the Scout HQ including trying to light a floating fire - one group succeeded! We also had trips to PACCAR, Bury Lake and Top Golf adding variety to the programme.

We were also able to re-start the Duke of Edinburgh programme as the restrictions on camping were lifted with training sessions on using Trangia stoves, pitching tents, menu selection and route planning as part of the weekly meeting.

This led to a practice walk for the bronze groups followed by two groups completing their assessed expeditions. Then it was the turn of those ready for silver and gold with a practice expedition in the Chilterns, permitted by the adjustments made to the award due to Covid.
