It also made us have a good tidy up and clear out amazing the extra "stuff" we have collected in the two years we have had the new building!

Chairman's Chat

It is a very good advertisement for the effectiveness of one of the many products manufactured by Sadolin. Allow me to elaborate. When the Scout HQ was built, now several years ago, we were conscious that, as it was constructed out of seasoned and treated timber, it would have to be retreated with another coat of preservative in a few years' time. After much research, phone calls to the manufacturer and visits to the suppliers of the substance, Richard Plume succeeded in finding the product which was ideal for our needs. Firstly, it was easy to apply by brush rather than spraying and secondly the grain of the timber is not obliterated even after two coats have been applied.

A number of working parties were formed and off to work they went. In whatever light you happen to look at the building, daylight or nighttime, I think you will agree that the effect is nothing short of first class. The hours of work put into the task have been time well spent, so it's thanks to everybody who helped complete this essential piece of work. For those interested in statistics, as Richard has stated in his article, a total of about ninety hours of work were undertaken. If we had employed a contractor at say £20 an hour (or more) that would have cost us £1,800 (or more).

Another impressive sight was the large quantity of well-turned-out boys, girls and Leaders representing the Group at the Remembrance Sunday service. We always manage to produce a good performance and well done to everybody involved with this important occasion in our calendar.

Unless you resort to an electronic version, it is probably premature to write up your calendar of appointments for 2022. Whatever means you choose we have decided to hold a Jumble Sale again next year. The event will take place at the usual time - 2pm - on Saturday 28th May. We are sure you will be pleased to donate goods to us for sale which have been accumulating in various parts of your house. Kenneth Nettleton's Eulogy

When Ken took on the role of Treasurer at 1st Northwood Scouts in the late 1980s, he had the perfect attributes for the job. He was an accountant, so he was familiar with the mechanics of the job, but more importantly he understood the need to save for the future. He was a quiet man who accomplished his tasks with a minimum of fuss, but he was never afraid to speak out at Executive Committee meetings when he didn't think we were spending our money wisely. And his criticisms were usually delivered with his wry grin!

One of Ken's major tasks each year was to mastermind the counting of the cash from our Grand Jumble Sale. This was no mean feat, as we frequently exceeded £10,000 in small change and notes to be counted in a single afternoon. Those of us allowed into the "counting room" remember Ken sitting at a table heaped high with coins, wading his way through them.

Ken's wise counsel meant that we put aside two sets of reserves in our accounts, from the surplus monies from Jumble Sale each year: one for a new Scout hut and the other for a new minibus. And they both were to prove invaluable to us.

Ken stood down from his role just as we started the project to build a new Scouting Centre, but when we started our Fundraising Appeal for £100,000, we were able to say to the world that we already have £35,000 in our reserves to start us on the path, thus able to show that we were serious about the job. And we know that Ken was really pleased for the Group when he attended the opening ceremony for the new Centre in September 2019.

The minibus reserve was also a lifeline for us. In autumn of 2018 the Explorers took our old minibus to the Brecon Beacons for some Duke of Edinburgh expeditions. The engine broke down big-time, and the vehicle was a write off. But even though we were in the middle of funding a new Scouting Centre, we still had £12,000 in our minibus reserve which went a long way towards a replacement bus. So, thank you Ken for all that you and your family did for 1st Northwood Scouts over so many years. You will be remembered.

Cub Collation

The Cubs as you would expect, haven't kept still this term!

The first few weeks back in September were a reminder about how Cubs run and the history of Cubs for all our new members before we turned our hand to camping. Only two out of 30 Cubs had camped as a Cub (which means without parents unlike Beavers.) Deciding that was too many to introduce in one go and wanting to stay local, we asked the Scouts to go out for the evening so that we could use the land beside the Scouting Centre. We ran the camp in two parts with half on Friday night/Saturday morning and the rest Saturday night/Sunday morning with the leaders doing both! It worked well, the Cubs enjoyed their introduction to camping, lots of parents helped supervise tent pitching before preparing a light supper whilst the Cubs went for a night walk on the Hogs Back - very exciting as most hadn't been out walking in the dark before but made even better by having glow sticks to play with!

After the camp we have stayed mainly inside although the Local Knowledge badge saw us walk to Northwood Hills station, take the tube to Northwood and then walk back to the HQ discovering local landmarks on our way. This completed the badge which had also seen the Cubs discover the history of Northwood with a visit from Mike who has lived here for many years and showed them lots of photos of then and now.

Paul Bushell, District Skills Instructor, gave up two evenings to teach the Cubs some basic 1st Aid so they can all now use a bandage and put each other in the recovery position. We must thank all the parents who have helped this term especially with the Home Help badge which saw the Cubs ironing, cleaning shoes and making so many cups of tea even I couldn't drink anymore! This is the parent's favourite badge as over half term the Cubs had to help with the washing, making their beds every day and cleaning - tasks we can't do in a meeting although we did have a go at changing a duvet. The final part of the badge is to make a one course meal which they have planned - we have pizza making before the end of term to cover that requirement.

As well as attending the Remembrance Service in Green Lane with strong numbers we found out about Scouting and Remembrance in one of our meetings. We also made felt poppies and learnt another #lifeskill by sewing on a button. The return of preparing Christmas parcels to send to Troops abroad at Christmas was also part of our Remembrance programme. Christmas crafts will see us finish the term with some fun and games too.

Samuel and Kai leave us for Scouts at the end of term where we know that they will have a great time continuing their Scouting journey, We look forward to seeing the rest of the Cubs back in January.
