Informally, the role of the Group Executive is to provide the wherewithal so that the Group Scout Leader and the other Leaders can provide interesting, exciting and safe Scouting for as many young people as we can. In other words, our job is to provide a safe headquarters and the necessary equipment for them to run safe meetings in accordance with the rules of the organisation. We go further than this and have always provided a minibus so that Leaders can take their sections out for activities away from Northwood without having to make special arrangements. So of course, to do all this, we have to raise a lot of money – cue the Jumble Sale!!!

The responsibilities of the Group Executive Committee are spelled out in detail in the Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) of the Scout Association. It expands considerably on my summary above, to include responsibilities for electing members, presenting and agreeing Annual Reports and Accounts, ensuring adequate insurance is in place, ensuring conformance to POR and so on.

As well as the obvious roles of Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer, we also allocate responsibilities for the practical aspects:

- Headquarters maintenance
- Minibus maintenance
- Grounds maintenance
- Scrap Metal sorting
- And we need someone to take responsibility for the kitchen.

We meet once a month usually on a Wednesday evening, in a formal but friendly atmosphere, and we receive reports from all the Scouting Sections, plus reports on finance, headquarters maintenance and minibus. Actions are placed as required.

Just before the start of term we joined the District with the return of a face-to-face St George's Day Parade. We met in The Drive and walked as a Group alongside 2nd Northwood and Poindexter Explorers to Ruislip Lido. There was a great turn out and it was lovely to see so many young people out together again after the last two years on screens. The event started with an inter-group challenge in which the Beavers had to cross the "river" to deliver one member for the Cubs to bandage up like a Mummy. Meanwhile the Scouts were busy building a stretcher to carry the mummy back again and raise the flag. The Challenge was followed by a short story about St George and then a celebration of top award recipients before each section renewed their Promise.

After jumble, the Cubs spent many meetings away from the headquarters. They enjoyed following the space walk at Ruislip Lido and discovering trees and wild plants on a walk around Oxhey Woods. We had two visits to Walter Davies Campsite near Gerrards Cross for archery and air rifle shooting - new activities for many of the Cubs which they adapted to very well. Another new activity for many was the water activities at Bury Lake. This year saw them out in small groups in a Katakuna boat which let them play games and practice paddling and the favourite, paddleboards.

As well as Pack nights we joined two District meetings this term. At the start of the term a team participated in the District Football. We might not have won but they all tried their best, worked well together and enjoyed the challenge despite the weather (it rained back in April!) Towards the end of term was the District Cub Sports Day. All who took part did very well with some individual medal winners. We were short of members for a few relay events but lent Cubs to other Packs so that scratch teams could take part.

We had a few nights using the grounds of the HQ (it was too hot to go inside!) where the Cubs learnt some basic knots, had a go pioneering, went on a litter picking walk and shared what they knew about healthy eating. The final meeting of term in temperatures of 40 degrees was, not surprisingly, a wet night. We started with some investitures and badge presentations before enjoying an ice cream (thank you Linda and Waitrose). Then we went on the Hogs Back for water relays; a water fight with syringes (surprisingly powerful) and then concluded with small groups trying to balance a bucket of water on their feet - not as easy as it might sound.



Jumble Sale – They Think It's All Over!

Some people think the Jumble Sale lasts for three hours, from 2 o'clock until 5 o'clock on the day. But actually, it lasts for nearer three months. It starts six weeks before the day with leaflet drops and collections, and this year went on for at least another six weeks afterwards. The sale was a great success; many people had faithfully stored their jumble for us for three years, knowing that we would not let them down. The weather was great, the buyers turned up and we almost reached the 2019 record for takings.

The clearing up is done in several stages. The first stage happens on the Saturday evening, when we have to bring anything of real value such as gazebos and other equipment inside our secure compound, as there is no security on the field. We also gather together the items that will be taken to the waste disposal site first thing next morning.

The second stage happens on Sunday morning, and this is a huge task. Basically, we have to clear the Hogsback open space of all our equipment and leftovers. We have a grab lorry to take away waste, and large numbers of volunteers to take down the large Gala Tents and Herras fencing and to bring inside our compound all remaining leftover jumble. The highlight of Sunday morning occurs at about 11.00am, when we sit down to a Full English Breakfast prepared by Ruth Stapleton and her team – this year she served forty-five breakfasts! That's how big the team was.

Regular visitors to the 1st Northwood Scouting Centre will have noticed that we took significantly longer than usual to clear away all the leftovers and equipment from the Jumble Sale this year. Unfortunately, the various dealers that come along and take away our left-over rags, books, glass and china etc. could not get to us on the day as they usually do, which meant we had to move all the clothes and linens, shoes, handbags, belts etc. into the main hall to keep them dry for a couple of weeks – a lot more work and inconvenience. But we received another £650 from all this stuff!

We found a dealer this year who would take all our books and small electrical items, but again his collections were spread over three weeks; the books earned us another £80 but, in the end, we only received about £10 for a large quantity of electrics, and we would have been better off cutting off the cables and selling the cable. We also received around £700 for all the scrap metal and cable that we had left at the end, always a good earner. And we donated twenty bikes that we didn't have time to overhaul ourselves to Recycle-a-bike, a not-for-profit organisation in Uxbridge that takes used bikes, renovates them and sells them at reasonable prices to the public.

By the end of June, we were in a position to take down the large Gala tent at the top end of the site, and then it took us another two or three weeks to get the site properly tidy with all the market stalls and Herras fencing stored away. We have also disposed of around twenty-five pallets as we don't need so many now that we don't sell furniture.

There we have it, all over for another year. So how long is a Jumble Sale? Not three hours but three months.
