## **Fund Raising**

As you know, we are back in the swing of it with our Jumble Sales now, but we are always on the lookout for other ways to raise funds to run the Group – it costs us between £6,000 and £8,000 a year to run the Group, and that is before any exceptional expenditure.

We have had an Easyfundraising account since we started raising funds for the new Scouting Centre, and in the last few weeks it has just tipped over the £1,000 mark in five years. But we only have twenty-one people signed up for it, despite having over a hundred families in our Group. Just think how much more money we could raise if you all signed up to it. The way it works is that once you have registered with the website, every time you buy something online from all the big retailers such as John Lewis, M&S, Tesco, Screwfix, Curry's and dozens more, you click the easyfundraising icon on the retailer's website, and our Group receives 1% or 2% of what you spend.

To register, click on the link below, and when it asks you to choose your "good cause", type in "1st Northwood Scouts New Hut Appeal". Ignore the other option of just 1st Northwood Scouts, that is the other 1st Northwood on the Isle of Wight!

#### Support a Good Cause

I've written before about the money we make from scrap metal. After Jumble Sale this year, we took over £700 for scrap metal and cable from jumble leftovers, so the decks were cleared in early June. By the end of October, we were once again overwhelmed by the amount of metal that had accumulated round the back of the building, much of it brought in by you, the parents of our young members. When we cleared the decks again in November, we raised another £1,060! The materials that make us the most money are copper pipe, brass plumbing fittings and electric cable. So, whenever you have a plumber or electrician round to your house, please ask him if you can keep the scraps from the job and bring them along to our HQ. Of course, all other metals are welcome too.

In Unit meetings, we had a visit from a member of the New Hope Charity which supports homeless people in Watford and were very generous with donations of food and other items for their use.
