Brownsea Island

A couple of sessions at the Scout HQ testing knots and lashings prepares them for Sky Camp which takes place at the end of September at PACCAR. We had four teams taking part this year - three from the Unit plus a team made up of Network members (the over 18s) who are going on the International Roverway expedition to Norway next summer. We didn't win this year, but they built and slept in some good structures, as the photos below show.

This term has seen the Unit continue with their project to repair, renovate and bring back to use the Nature Area at Hillside School. The weather stopped progress so there's still more to do in the Spring, but a good amount of clearing has been completed.

Other activities that are always popular are laser tag in the woods by St Vincent's Nursing Home, lots of cooking and baking, first aid and local hikes. Making them work a bit harder, we held a debate night which started off with a *Just a Minute* style activity with topics ranging from Ben Nevis to Bananas and Paperclips to Air Fryers - they were surprisingly good and not repeating themselves or pausing! They then split into groups to prepare a debate with half considering whether Al would replace their future jobs and half looking at whether we should have driverless cars. We also had a visit from New Hope who support homeless people, finding out what they do and thinking about what causes homelessness.
