After the Lord Mayor's Show

This was the first time we had ever run a Jumble Sale without Paul Akers to guide and encourage us. We kept on missing his happy face, bright shirts, silly hats and words of wisdom, but we did you proud this year Paul, with a record breaking financial result.

Unfortunately Mr. Murphy decided that he couldn't continue to provide his lorries for collection days or for the big Sunday clear up. We knew we could cope with the collections OK, but we were quite worried how we would cope without the big grab lorry for waste disposal on the Sunday morning. As it happened, we coped very well, mainly because we had less "stuff" to dispose of. We do our best to recycle most of what we have left over, minimising the waste that goes to the council facility.

We had two District Vans this year – the Scout District had bought a replacement one, and still had the old one, awaiting arrangements for scrappage under the ULEZ scheme. So together with the WRAP van, we did five van loads to the Council waste facility on Sunday morning, and it was all over – well, that was it for the Sunday, and the Hogsback field was clear.

The following three weeks saw follow up activities almost every day:

- All the toys were taken to a local charity by one of our helpers on Sunday morning.
- Monday 10th snipping plugs off cables, ready to take to the scrap metal dealer
- Tuesday the Scouts from Pinner collected all the leftover china, for their smashing china stalls through the year
- And all the records were given to the Vinyl Basement at Estamira in Green Lane.
- Wednesday we took about twenty-five bikes to a Bike Recycling hub in Uxbridge. They overhaul them and sell to the public.
- Thursday we took all the glassware to the Sue Ryder shop in Ruislip.
- Friday was another run to the Council waste facility.
- Monday 17th sorting scrap metal, separating the brass, copper and aluminium.
- Wednesday we returned to Hayes the mini tractor that we borrow to move equipment round the field.
- Thursday we did the first two scrap metal runs.
- Over a ton of mixed iron earned us £201, and the valuable metals amounted to £417.
- Friday was a day off!
- Sunday all the books were loaded up to take to the Sue Ryder shop.
- · However, when I called them on Monday to confirm the arrangement, they told me they had a backlog of books as their
- collection arrangement had let them down. We couldn't have the van left loaded with books for a week, so on Monday 24th
- we took them to the Council waste facility.
- Wednesday was the final scrap metal run, another £156.
- Friday 28th our rags man collected all our leftover clothes, shoes, belts, hats, household linens. He paid us over £400.

So a full three weeks after the day of the sale, we finally cleared the decks. But of course we still have lots of items to sell on eBay!
